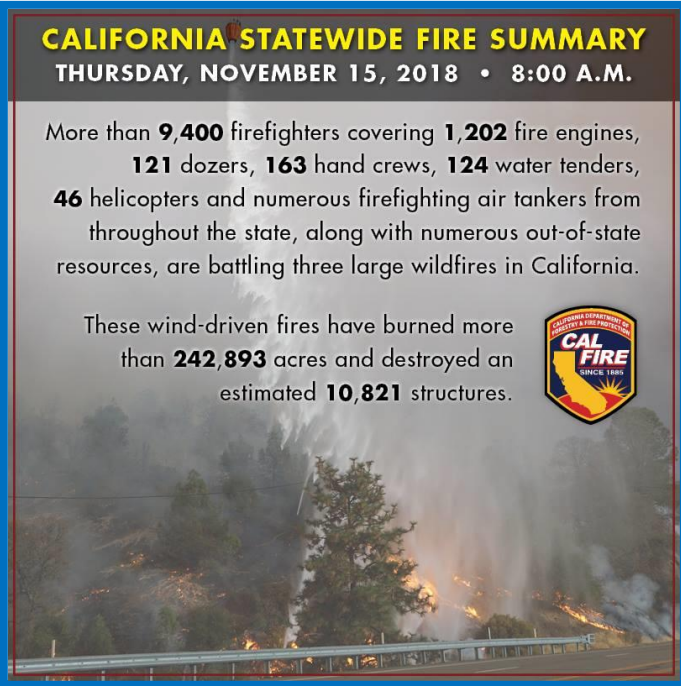

## California Statewide Fire Summary Thursday, November 15, 2018

### CALIFORNIA STATEWIDE FIRE SUMMARY THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 15, 2018 • 8:00 A.M.

More than **9,400** firefighters covering **1,202** fire engines, **121** dozers, **163** hand crews, **124** water tenders, **46** helicopters and numerous firefighting air tankers from throughout the state, along with numerous out-of-state resources, are battling three large wildfires in California.

These wind-driven fires have burned more than **242,893** acres and destroyed an estimated **10,821** structures.

- South of Simi Valley
- 98,362 acres, 57% contained
- Estimated 504 structures destroyed
- Evacuations and road closures remain in effect
- CAL FIRE Incident Management Team 5 (Parkes) assigned. IMT#5 managing both Hill and Woolsey fires

## National Weather Service San Francisco Bay Area

958 AM PST Thu Nov 15 2018 - SYNOPSIS...Smoke and haze will continue to produce poor air quality over much of the San Francisco Bay through late week. Dry and mild conditions are also likely to persist through early next week with the potential for slight improvement in smoky conditions by the weekend as weak onshore flow returns. A more significant pattern change appears likely during the latter half of next week with the potential for widespread rainfall.
